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## Eight million kroner project to reduce the unemployment rate in the Zealand Region

RUC and the University of Southern Denmark (SDU) now take active steps to try to raise the level of competence and knowledge in the Zealand Region and to reduce the unemployment rate for university graduates.

#### HR and Communication

The intention with the project entitled 'Knowledge employees in Region Zealand' is to increase the number of specific collaborations between universities and enterprises and thus provide a basis for natural collaboration with and for employment of university graduates in small and medium-sized enterprises on the entire island of Zealand.

"With this project, we launch an ambitious and extensive project. The collaborations will give enterprises access to new knowledge and specific development opportunities, and the students gain relevant practical experience," said project manager at RUCinnovation, Maj Parker Wagner.

In addition to the universities wanting to ensure that enterprises will benefit from the students' competencies during the day-to-day performance of assignments, RUC and SDU want to introduce the enterprises to a broad range of collaborations such as project- and work placement partnerships, student jobs and different camps – all with the purpose of creating the foundation for problem solving, development and growth. Similarly, the students will be presented to specific collaborations with a wide range of companies, and events focusing on collaboration with and in the regional business life, will be organised on an ongoing basis.

The project is scheduled to run until 1 October 2014 and has a financial framework totalling DKK 8 million, which is financed by funds from the European Social Fund, Growth Forum Zealand's regional development funds and the universities' own funding.

The project is being carried out alongside the project VidenMetro of the Evv fund (business,

knowledge, growth) – a project running during the same period and intended to create

and fill 200 jobs for university graduates in the regional small and medium-sized enterprises.
